*Democracy requires accountability. Our 2025 Reproductive Freedom Legislative Scorecard helps you hold representatives accountable on reproductive rights as November's House election approaches.*

*Virginia is making progress with the **Constitutional Amendment for Reproductive Freedom** passing both chambers along party lines. As Governor Youngkin has no authority over constitutional amendments, we've completed the first year of this two-year process. Maintaining our slim House majority this November is crucial to pass it again in 2026.*

*While most proactive bills passed the General Assembly, they've been blocked by the Governor. Surprisingly, birth control has become a battleground in the Commonwealth. Despite bipartisan support for contraception legislation, Youngkin opposes these common-sense measures used by 99% of women—highlighting why we need the Constitutional Amendment.*

*One success: the Governor signed the **Reproductive & Sexual Health Consumer Protection Act (SB754)**, securing data privacy rights. And not one anti-abortion bill advanced in committee!*

*Virginians support reproductive freedom. We won't allow the devastating consequences seen in abortion ban states to happen here. With your help, RRVA will organize, hold officials accountable, and support candidates this November. Together, these are our superpowers! Together, we will fight. Together, we will win!*

## Scoring Criteria

Grade/Designation/Description

### A+ - Champion

A legislator who supports our legislative agenda and bills protecting access to abortion and reproductive healthcare and votes against every attack on reproductive freedom. A + is added to lawmakers that speak up for reproductive freedom on the floor, in committee, at press conferences, etc.

### A - Leader

A legislator who votes in favor of abortion and other reproductive healthcare services, but they did not patron/co-patron RRVA's proactive reproductive freedom bills or speak out in favor of reproductive rights & freedom.

### B - Ally

A legislator who mostly votes in favor of abortion and other reproductive healthcare services, but not all of their votes are consistent with RRVA's values. They also did not patron/co-patron proactive reproductive freedom bills.

### C - Challenger

A legislator who opposes the right to abortion consistently with their votes but may sometimes choose to support other reproductive freedom and/or bodily autonomy initiatives. They did not sponsor/co-sponsor any bills regarding reproductive health and freedom.

### D - Opponent

A legislator who consistently votes for attacks on abortion and bodily autonomy but also might rarely support bipartisan proactive reproductive freedom measures.

### F - Extremist

A legislator who patrons or co-patrons anti-abortion or anti-reproductive freedom legislation and always votes against RRVA's proactive legislative agenda.

# SCORED BILLS

## Constitutional Amendment for Reproductive Freedom, HJ/ SJ247

**Patrons: Leader Herring & Senator Boysko**

This resolution enshrines abortion access, birth control, IVF, and pregnancy care rights in Virginia's Constitution while protecting against discrimination. It must pass the 2026 General Assembly before it goes on the ballot for Virginians to vote on in November 2026. Passed by the House & Senate down along party lines.

## Right to Contraception, HB1716/SB1105

**Patrons: Delegate Price Senator Hashmi**

This bill establishes Virginians' right to obtain contraceptives and sue those who prevent access. Passed by the House & Senate.

## Consumer Protection Act, SB754

**Patron: Senator Favola**

This bill prohibits businesses from obtaining or sharing reproductive health information without consent, including data on pregnancy, menstruation, or abortion searches. Passed by the House & Senate; Signed by the Governor!

## Extradition Protections, SB743 & SB1098

**Patrons: Senator Favola & Senator Hashmi**

These "shield bills" prevent Virginia from extraditing individuals who received legal medical procedures here, protecting both providers and those who assist patients. Passed by the Senate. Left on the table by the House Courts of Justice Committee.

## Contraceptive Equity Act, HB2371/SB780

**Patrons: Delegate Mundon King & Senator Carroll Foy**

This bill requires insurance carriers to cover contraceptives without copays if they cover prescription drugs, expanding access to various birth control methods. Passed by the House & Senate.

## Contraceptive Bills

Access to contraception is a fundamental right and integral to healthcare. Contraception goes beyond personal choice to essential healthcare, and impacts health outcomes, economic stability, and gender equality.

Even anti-abortion activists support contraception. Delegate Lovejoy (R-Prince William), who voted to pass the **Contraceptive Equity Act**, told our team, "There is no one who supports contraception more than the pro-life movement." Yet he contradicted this stance by voting against the **Right to Contraception** bill.

Passing legislation that protects contraceptive rights was a key priority this year. The **Right to Contraception** bill and **Contraceptive Equity Act** were major steps that passed the legislature with bipartisan support. Governor Youngkin sent the bills back gutted when the General Assembly rejected his amendments.

Contraceptives are popular across the political spectrum. While Virginians want control of if, when, and who they form a family with, some politicians believe they should control access and decide for us. This is why **elections matter**.



# HJ1 & SJ247 – CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT FOR REPRODUCTIVE FREEDOM

*That every individual has the fundamental right to reproductive freedom, including the ability to make and carry out decisions relating to one's own prenatal care, childbirth, postpartum care, contraception, abortion care, miscarriage management, and fertility care.*

*An individual's right to reproductive freedom shall not be, directly or indirectly, denied, burdened, or infringed upon unless justified by a compelling state interest achieved by the least restrictive means.*

*Notwithstanding the above, the Commonwealth may regulate the provision of abortion care in the third trimester, provided that in no circumstance shall the Commonwealth prohibit an abortion (i) that in the professional judgment of a physician is medically indicated to protect the life or physical or mental health of the pregnant individual or (ii) when in the professional judgment of a physician the fetus is not viable.*

*The Commonwealth shall not discriminate in the protection or enforcement of this fundamental right.*

*The Commonwealth shall not penalize, prosecute, or otherwise take adverse action against an individual based on such individual's own exercise of this fundamental right or such individual's own actual, potential, perceived, or alleged pregnancy outcomes, including miscarriage, stillbirth, or abortion. The Commonwealth shall not penalize, prosecute, or otherwise take adverse action against any individual for aiding or assisting another individual in exercising such other individual's right to reproductive freedom with such other individual's voluntary consent.*

*For the purposes of this section, a state interest is compelling only if it is for the limited purpose of maintaining or improving the health of an individual seeking care, consistent with accepted clinical standards of care and evidence-based medicine and does not infringe on that individual's autonomous decision making.*

*This section shall be self-executing. Any provision of this section held invalid shall be severable from the remaining portions of the section.*





## Thank You for Powering Our Advocacy

This legislative session, REPRO Rising Virginia's grassroots power was on full display. In total, there were over 2,400 actions taken by supporters to defend and advance reproductive freedom in Virginia. Every message, signature, testimony, and event made a difference.

### Together, we:

- Collected 1,207 signatures from Virginians supporting passing the Constitutional Amendment for Reproductive Freedom.
- Made 322 constituent contacts to legislators through our Legislative Rapid Response Team.
- Submitted 23 written personal stories in support of our priority bills.
- Joined our Virginians for Reproductive Freedom partners in creating & delivering 600 Valentine's cards to legislators about the constitutional amendment.
- Delivered more than 850 messages to Governor Youngkin urging him to sign both the Contraceptive Equity Act & the Right to Contraception bill.
